Casting



- It's easy to make figurines, ornaments, or seasonal decorations for your home! Start by mixing Durham's Water Putty to the consistency of heavy cream. Immediately pour the mixture into the mold, and tapping to bring air bubbles to the surface. After the putty has set, carefully remove from the mold. Now your project is ready to paint – great crafts for kids!



Carving



- Blocks of putty can be used to carve figurines if you have been hesitant to use wood or stone. Putty doesn't need to be completely dry to start your carving – it is actually easier to carve if it is the consistency of a bar of soap. The completed object can be sanded, polished or painted and shows the unique hand-carving pattern.

Modeling



- Durham's Rock Hard Water Putty is often used in creating models or scenic scapes for models. Since water putty sets up faster than clay and other modeling materials, it is a great choice when needing to add strength to your models or creating texture.

Mosaic



- Mosaics are often used for trivets, coasters, wall plaques and many other items. This can easily be accomplished by embedding tile, glass, pebbles, shells or other material into Durham's Putty which can be used as an alternative to grouting material.

Sand Sculpting



- Sand Sculpting is an interesting way to make wall hangings or plaques for an easel. Pack wet sand into a box then draw a design into the sand and let dry. After dry, prepare Durham's putty and carefully place into the dry sand mold without disturbing the design. Then cover with a layer of putty. Once dry, carefully remove the sides of your box and brush away excess sand. The remaining grains of sand give your plaque an attractive surface
